Freedom of Information Act Request Response No. 26092016-1

Question

"I want to know the number of reported fraud cases where a member of staff at a bank was allegedly involved in perpetrating the crime.

I would also like to know, in how many of these cases did the member of staff get convicted of the crime.

Finally, I would like a figure for the total amount lost to fraud where the case involved a member of staff at a bank. Again, I would like this figure to cover the period from the start of September 2011."

Answer

I am writing to advise you that, following a search of our paper and electronic records, I have established that the information you requested is not held by the Office of the Northamptonshire Police and Crime Commissioner.

The Office of the Northamptonshire Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC) and Northamptonshire Police are two separate legal entities. Information regarding operational policing matters are the responsibility of Northamptonshire Police, therefore the OPCC does not hold any of the information you requested. Northamptonshire Police's Information Unit may hold some of the information you are seeking. If you are dissatisfied with the handling of your request, you have the right to ask for an internal review. Please remember to quote the reference number above in any future communications. If you are not content with the outcome of the internal review, you have the right to apply directly to the Information Commissioner for a decision.
